FROM FATHER TED



EPIPHANY: A SEASON OF BLESSING & NEW BEGINNINGS

St. Philip's Parish will celebrate the Feast of Epiphany on Sunday, January 7, at 10am. The actual feast day is January 6th, but we have translated the celebration to the 7th to increase the number present for the celebration. This will be another good time to invite family and friends to church.

Three Stories of Epiphany - "Epiphany" comes from the Greek word meaning "to reveal." For Christians, Epiphany is related to the "revelation" of Jesus as the Messiah prophesied by the Hebrew prophets. There are 3 major Epiphany stories in the

Gospels that point to and reveal Jesus as the Messiah to Gentiles, as well as Jews. The one celebrated on January 6th, and this year for us on the 7th, is the visit of the Magi (Wise Men) as it is told in the Gospel of Matthew and in the magnificent stained glass window at the east end of our worship space. (Check it out on the 7th) The second is the Baptism of Jesus when the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, descends upon Jesus in the 3 synoptic gospels. At the same time, in the accounts of Luke and Mark, the voice of the Father, Almighty is recorded as addressing Jesus by saying "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased", while in Matthew the voice states "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:13–17; Mark 1:9–11; Luke 3:21–23). The third Epiphany story is the Wedding at Cana at which Jesus turns water in to wine. This miracle is described only in the Gospel of John. It is Jesus' first public miracle in that gospel.

Blessings - The Church traditionally blesses certain things on the Feast of Epiphany: Holy Water, Epiphany Chalk, and Homes. Epiphany Chalk is specially consecrated to bless homes. On January 7th, we will bless Holy Water and Epiphany Chalk at our 10am service.

Chalking the Door - With blessed Epiphany Chalk, you will be able to practice this ancient tradition. The process begins with the priest blessing the Epiphany Chalk. The next step consists of you writing a pattern of numbers and letters over the entryway of your home. The pattern contains a date and initials with a specific meaning. The numbers change each year to reflect the new calendar year. This year's pattern is: 20 + C + M + B + 24. The CMB remain the same as they represent initials. The set of initials relates to the traditional names for the 3 magi; Caspar, Melchior, & Balthazar. This reminds the reader of Epiphany by referencing the Adoration of the Magi. CMB are also initials of the Latin words: Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which mean Christ Bless this Dwelling. Both explanations of the initials point to the blessing of God and Epiphany. The + signs (crosses) represent the Cross of Christ. The next step is to say a prayer asking God's blessing. *Blessed chalk, directions, and prayers to say for the House Blessing will be provided at our January 7th Sunday Service*.

New Beginnings - January is a time for new resolutions and new ways of living. As you move into 2024, I invite you to use the Epiphany Season as a chance to invest more time in your spiritual life and practice. It can begin with marking your door with Epiphany Chalk, asking God's blessing, and seeing God at work in your life each day you see 20+C+M+B+24.

Welcoming the Stranger

Members of St. Philips have recently had a unique opportunity to live into Christ's call to welcome the stranger (Matthew 25: 35) and live into our Baptismal Covenant to "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself." In recent months, a small group of parish member have attended trainings provided by RAISE and registered with them so that they would be prepared to serve as a Welcome Team for a refugee family that would arrive in Joplin in the future. Early December we were contacted by RAISE and asked if we could help them with a young family that would soon be arriving from a refugee camp in the Congo. The evening of Tuesday

December 12 the tired family got off the plane at the Joplin airport (after traveling 36 hours to get here) and were welcomed by a group of St Philip's members, RAISE employees and other refugees who have previously been re-settled in our community (see picture). The day before the family arrived, we were busy bees putting a home together and picked up donated furniture, set up bed frames, stocked a kitchen with donated pans and dishes, and purchased linens and a few essential household items with some of our Outreach funds.

The first week the family was here we also set up additional donated furniture; hooked up a donated TV and washer and dryer; took the family shopping and purchased warm coats shoes and socks with Outreach funds; provided a few donated books and toys for the children and provided lots of support to the family as they began navigating life in the USA. We also picked up the family and brought them to church the first Sunday they were here (per their request) where they were warmly welcomed by our larger parish family.

A bit of background information - when they were 10 years old, the Congolese village that Freddie (the father) and Lydia (the mother) lived in was brutally attacked and their parents and siblings were all killed. They escaped and found by "kind people" and taken to a refugee camp. They had lived in that camp for over 17 years and all five of their children were born there. The children ages 13, 10, 7, 4 and almost 2 have only lived in the camp and never had a home. The family went through a two-year vetting process before being approved to come to our country. They are Christians. They do not know much English/speak Swahili.

At this time the parents are taking ESL classes through RAISE/Crowder College and the school aged children have been enrolled in school. With ongoing support from RAISE, the goal for this family is that within the next 3-6 months they will become self-sufficient. Our role will also transition from serving as a Welcome Team to becoming ongoing friends.

I want to offer my sincere thanks to the members of our Welcome Team that have stepped up and cheerfully done whatever was asked of them, as well as those who have donated items (and have asked to remain anonymous). I pray that in the weeks to come each of you finds a way to get to know this wonderful family. Those of us who are working with them now have already been truly blessed by this experience.



Traditionally, families in our parish light the candles of the wreath.



- The Summary Report and Small Groups will provide members and the Search Committee the most valuable information in preparing for our Rector Search and Parish Profile.
- When formed, the Search Committee will also have a ZOOM call with the Holy Cow Interpreter, Susan Czolgosz. (See her picture & info in this newsletter)
- A link to the 3 Hour Interpretation Video will be made available to all members, at the appropriate time.

Vestry Meeting Minutes Sunday, November 19th, 2023 11:56AM

Blake Webster led the invocation. Andy Campbell will lead in December.

Agenda - Chris Smiley moved to adopt the agenda, Calvin Cassady seconded. All in favor, no abstentions. Last month's Vestry minutes – Blake Webster moved to accept the Vestry minutes, Phil Metz seconded. All in favor, no abstentions.

Boyscout's Presentation – Jacob Bakker District Executive for the BSA Ozark Trails Council spoke to the Vestry about chartering a cub scout pack. Phil O'Hare is the Charter Organization Representative (COR) for the boy scout troop and would also be for the cub scouts. He has 10 kids interested right now. They would meet on Wednesday nights from 6:30-7:30 the same time as the boy scouts. Blake Webster moved to approve the charter with the addendum that the charter can be revoked at will if there is an issue that cannot be resolved, Chris Smiley seconded. All in favor, one abstention. Will also talk to Phil about having someone be a second COR.

Account #1130 Stifel Endowment down 512,334.99 from September.

3. Account #2420 Payroll Tax Withheld up SI,738.21 mostly due to Father Ted receiving paycheck in October and not in September.

4. Account #3124 Memorial 400 down S12,169.29 due to payment to Total Electronics Contracting. Income Statement:

1. Account #4110 Pledge Payments down 51,245.

2. Account #4115 Unpledged Donations up 52,706.

3. Account #6010 Electric up SI,331.12. There were two payments made in August, no payments in September, and a payment made in October.

4. Account #6110 Church Building Repairs & Main up 534,365.56. This is due to church foundation payment.

5. Account #6390 Miscellaneous Administrative down 51,080 as there were no expenses for this account in October.

6. Account #6410 Rector Salary up 55,791.67 and Account #6420 Rector Housing up SI,000 as Father Ted did not have September paycheck, but did have October paycheck.


