Amen.

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
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FROM FATHER RYAN



This may seem silly, but this is quite possibly the hardest item I have ever had to write. How do I introduce myself as your new rector in a pithy 500-600 words (gauging the average word count of Fr. Ted's impeccable entries in this space the past couple years)? How do I express my vision for ministry, tell a little about myself, brag on my beautiful family and adorably neurotic dog Scout (they are and she is), give you insight to my formation, share something profound, maybe something a little funny or charming, quote a long dead saint or other great Christian thinker, pepper in some scripture, and wrap it all up in a neat nice bow ready to do it all again next month... Meanwhile I have already wasted 130, 131, 132 words (you get the idea) commiserating this reality! And I thought slimming down my sermons from 45 minutes in my former life as a Baptist pastor to the palatable 12-15 minutes for Episcopal ears was a challenge...!

One of the best pieces of advice I received regarding preaching and sermon prep as a young seminarian came from a guest lecturer (forgive me, I don't remember his name) in one of my preaching classes. He told us to treat the preaching week to week like telephone poles along a highway. I don't know if you played this backseat road trip game like I did as a child — I would try to focus my eyes on the oncoming telephone pole as I sat bored in the back of the family minivan as my dad zoomed down the highway. I would focus intently on the pole tracking it with my eyes so that it remained clear in focus as it got closer and closer. As soon as the pole and our van crossed paths and the telephone sped past us, my eyes would immediately jump to the next pole in the line, and I would try to focus my eyes all over again.

This is how my guest lecturer encouraged us to view the preaching life. Each week, the Sunday service comes barreling towards me. Each week I give our time and effort and attention to crafting a sermon that lets the scriptures speak and leaves room for the Holy Spirit to moves us all. With focus and attention and intention I seek to do my level best, but as soon as Sunday passes by I let the last service pass by in the rear view and turn my attention to the next week ready to give it full attention. I might bring lessons from the previous week to help me in the upcoming week, but I don't dwell on any failures and foibles because last week's sermon is in the rear view, and I have more work to do as the next Sunday is coming down the line. There's always another telephone pole zooming down the side of the highway.

So that's the good news — I don't have to do all the work of introduction now in this one newsletter entry, just like I don't have to do all the work of ministry in the next sermon, or the next adult ed. class, or the next liturgical season. I am here for the long game. I look forward to getting to know each and every one of you and sharing myself with you as well as we close out ordinary time and begin our preparations for the excitement and anticipation of Advent. In the week-in and week-out of the day-to-day and the Sunday-to-Sunday there's is plenty of space to do the work. It doesn't all happen all at once.

To that end — I want to get coffee, grab lunch, go out to dinner, go on a bike ride, etc. with YOU. I want to hear from each and every one of you and get to know you. This is my first goal as your new rector. I want to set up some time with each of you in the next 6 months to a year to hear a little about you and what makes you, you. I want to get to know the unique Imago Dei that exudes from each of you, and I want to hear your hopes and dreams for St. Philip's. Before this was my parish it has been yours, so I know each of you have your own particular perspectives that I greatly value.

So, I'll be reaching out. To wit — there's a lot of you and only one of me, which means it is going to take some time. If you don't like how long it is taking for me to get around to you, then give me a call, shoot me an email or grab me at church and let's set up a date. Because I am serious when I say as your rector, I want to know you.

Maybe the second-best advice I got in seminary came from one of my theology professors, Amy Laura Hall. Being a pastor's kid herself (from the Methodist tradition) she said her dad always told her that to actually have church you have to know how your pastor smells. And I believe the reverse is true as well. If I am going to be even halfway effective as your rector I need to know how my parishioners smell. Or maybe to put it more delicately, as C.S. Lewis writes in *The Four Loves*, "Friendship is unnecessary, like philosophy, like art.... It has no survival value; rather it is one of those things which give value to survival." That's what we find in the Church — those relationships, those companionships of divine origin, those experiences and fidelities that make up "those things which give value to survival."

We've got to be in each other's lives, if we are going to get on with this thing called Church — sharing all that God has for us, all that God is shaping us to be, all the fears and hopes and heartaches and hurts — the joys and the mysteries and the mirth along the way. So, reach out, let's grab coffee. If you don't first, then I will. Grace and peace.

A Great Cloud of Witnesses

On Wednesday Sept. 18, I was asked to substitute for Fr Jim at the 5:30pm service in the Chapel. One the resources used for this service in a book titled *A Great Cloud of Witnesses*. This book lists Bible readings (OT, Psalm, NT and Gospel) for every day of the year. Each day a person (sometimes well-known sometimes obscure) is remembered along with a collect that focuses on a holy attribute or spiritual gift that person possessed and the designated readings then go on to expound on that.

The person designated for Sept. 18 was Dag Hammarskjold. Some of you may remember him. He died in a plane crash while serving as a peace negotiator in Africa

in 1961. He was a remarkable person who, in 1953 at age 47, became the youngest person to serve as the Sec. General of the UN. President John F. Kennedy called him "one of the great peacemakers of our time." He was also the first person to be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize posthumously.

Dag was the son of a former Swedish prime minister, and his family included people who had distinguished careers in law, banking, and as clergy. He himself studied linguistics, history, law, and economics. Dag is remembered for his belief in "preventative" diplomacy. He is remembered for his work toward the reconstruction of Europe post-WWII, the restructuring the UN to make it more efficient, developing the UN peacekeeping operations, and helping to avert numerous crises from China to the Middle East (most notably the Suez Canal). He was a skilled negotiator and was also known for his talents in art and poetry.

He was a remarkable person who lived a life of service to the world. We are still the beneficiaries of his positive impact today. I believe he had such a great impact due to his deep belief that in the Gospels it clearly points out that "all humans are equals as children of God."

We are all called by God, through the scriptures, to be peacemakers – to break down the dividing walls between us – to foster forgiveness and reconciliation. However, we find this difficult to actually do because some people are difficult to deal with ... many people today are very angry, and they feel justified in their anger ... many people are just unkind and others, are just plain rude or for a multitude of other reasons. However, as disciples of Christ we are called to strive to "be perfect as your Father in Heaven is perfect." We are called to manifest the love of God for all persons – our enemies as well as our friends. This has nothing to do with a reciprocal relationship. It is about loving with no thought of getting anything in return.

So – let's keep Dag Hammarskjold in mind as we reflect on the Ministry of the Laity (BCP pg.855). It states you are called to "bear witness to Christ, wherever you may be, according to the gifts given you and to carry out Christ's work of reconciliation in the world."

Dag Hammarskjold certainly lived into his call as a Lay Minister of the Church. Please pray about how *you* are being called to work with God to foster peace in your families, our church, our community, our nation and the world. Dag is a reminder that we have a great cloud of witnesses cheering us on!

FROM OUR ORGANIST - CALEB



Over the past few months, my newsletter articles have explored the connections between the hymns and other music chosen for worship. While this is important, it raises the question of how these selections are made and why specific hymns are chosen. It's not just a matter of flipping through the hymnal and picking hymns that fit a narrative. The purpose of music in worship is not only to enhance the experience for the congregation but also to deepen understanding of the readings.

When I do my job effectively, each hymn is linked to a line of scripture or a thematic idea for that particular Sunday. The Hymnal 1982 is a rich collection with 720 hymns for congregational singing, each referencing scripture, a collect prayer, or a theme. Mastering this hymnal and knowing which hymn corresponds to which reading is quite a challenge. Fortunately, there are resources to assist music directors in this process. The music director edition of the hymnal includes a scriptural index that indicates which hymns align with specific readings. Additionally, there's a resource called *Liturgical Music for the Revised Common Lectionary* that offers suggestions for each Sunday across the three liturgical years. However, choosing hymns involves more than just consulting these tools; there's a specific "flow" to worship that can feel off if not executed properly, even if it's hard to pinpoint why.

For example, the opening hymn should welcome the congregation and set the mood for the day. It's typically the second piece of music heard and the first that captures attention. I often aim to connect the opening hymn to the collect, as it establishes the prayerful tone of worship. The subsequent pieces, such as the offertory hymn, should more directly relate to the scripture readings, sometimes being reflective or jubilant. These may not always be familiar favorites (I refer to them as "asparagus hymns" because they nourish us in a different way). The closing hymn should send us forth into the world to fulfill God's calling, reflecting on the readings and allowing us to process our church experience.

Selecting music is no small task. Each Sunday requires hours of planning. The music director must meditate on the readings and grasp their significance to choose hymns that truly enhance the worship experience.

Nancy J Jennings - September 4, 1946 - September 5, 2024

Nancy Jeanne Jennings, age 78 of Joplin, Missouri, passed peacefully on Thursday, September 5, 2024 at Carthage Health and Rehab. Nancy was born September 4, 1946 in Glendale, California to the late Albert and Bernice Stokes Sulzner.

Nancy graduated college and began a career of teaching art for the Diamond School District. She later became a Case Worker with the Division of Family Services where she retired after a long and enjoyable career.

Nancy was very active in the community, including involvement with the Heartland Opera and the Spiva Art Center. She was not just a talented artist, Nancy was a

talented vocalist as well. She used her gifts with her church, St. Philip's Episcopal Church of Joplin and was a part of the St. Ann's Altar Guild.

Nancy is survived by her extended family and a special long-time friend, Ramona Shields and her husband, Hugh.

Other than her parents, Nancy is preceded in death by a sister, Chris Senter.

Burial of ashes will take place at a later date at St. Philip's Church of Joplin.

Cremation arrangements are under the direction of Parker Mortuary, Joplin, Missouri.

MIFF DIKEMAN - September 4, 1941 - September 12, 2024



Merry "Miff" Dikeman, a cherished mother, grandmother, and esteemed community leader, passed away on September 12, 2024, in Joplin, MO. She was born on September 4, 1941.

Miff's early years in Santa Fe, New Mexico, laid the foundation for a life marked by service and leadership. Married on September 2, 1964, to Mason Dikeman, they came to Joplin in 1970; where she became a pillar of the community. Her strategic thinking and charismatic leadership left an indelible mark on Joplin's community.

Her contributions to the community included Membership Chairman of Joplin Little Theatre Board of Directors, President of the Joplin Historical Museum, Joplin Chamber

of Commerce Leadership Joplin Committee, and Spiva Art Center Board. She was a long-time member of St. Philip's Episcopal Church, serving on St. Margaret's Guild and the Women of St. Philips. Miff was a past President of Chapter FI PEO Sisterhood. Under her guidance as the first woman to serve as General Chairman of the United Way Campaign; the organization achieved a historic fundraising milestone, surpassing the fundraising goal. As President of the Thomas Hart Benton Permanent Exhibit, she worked tirelessly to preserve and promote the legacy of the renowned artist, coordinating the display of his large scale mural depicting Joplin in 1900.

Along with her local community involvement, she was instrumental in the Missouri State Republican Party. In 1988, Miff was elected Missouri State Committee Woman to the Missouri Republican Party 32nd Senatorial District for Jasper, Newton, Dade, and Barton Counties. She organized a "Dole for President" Rally for Senator Bob Dole in Joplin.

She was Co-owner and Corporate President of Exclusively Her, Inc., a fine clothing store in Joplin. Later, Miff served as the station manager for KOZJ, Ozarks Public Television, where she championed quality programming and educational content. Retiring from corporate life; she trained to become a Licensed Nail Technician owning and operating a successful business and building a dedicated clientele.

Miff's legacy is carried on by her loving children. Survivors include a son, Glenn Dikeman; a daughter Kristina Ritter; son-in-law Todd Ritter; and grandchildren, Henry Dikeman, Etta Dikeman, Nick Ritter and Travis Ritter. She was preceded in death by her parents, Dr. John and Ruth Glenn; her devoted husband, Mason Dikeman; and her sister, Barbara Sue Walker.

Miff's life was a testament to her unwavering commitment to her family, her community, and the causes she held dear. Her leadership, generosity, and indomitable spirit will be profoundly missed by all who had the privilege of knowing her. Miff Dikeman's memory will continue to inspire future generations to live with purpose and to serve with passion.

A Memorial Service will be held on Thursday, September 26th at 5:30 p.m. at St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Joplin, MO. It will be officiated by Father Ted Estes.
